Fellow lives out Department's mission in NWT

Dr. Arlene MacDougall headed to Yellowknife to *Educate, Discover* and *Heal*

Dr. Arlene MacDougall has joined the Dalhousie Global Psychiatry team as part of her Fellowship and will be working extensively on a partnership between the Department and the Stanton Territorial Health Authority (STHA), with the goal of developing and implementing a comprehensive collaborative care approach to strengthen clinical care services currently available to the population of the Northwest Territories and western Nunavut.

Dr. MacDougall, who completed her medical degree at the University of British Columbia and psychiatry training at McMaster University, will be a Fellow with the Department from July 1, 2012 to June 30, 2013. She will make at least three visits to the NWT, the first beginning late August and ending at the end of September. The other visits will be two weeks in length. She will be working mostly at a psychiatry outpatient clinic in downtown Yellowknife, but

will also complete some inpatient work at Stanton Territorial Hospital and will be involved in travel clinics in the outlying communities of Hay River, Fort Simpson and Fort Providence.

When Dr. MacDougall is not on site in the NWT she will be providing telehealth consultations to patients there. This "distance clinical service delivery," as it is being called, will be used to enhance the existing psychiatry services and is a key part of the collaboration with STHA. The NWT has not had a permanent psychiatrist in a number of years, so the collaboration is something they are relying on and hope will be long-term.

The Department will also be partnering with STHA to develop systems delivery, mental health education and training for health care professionals, and a research agenda for the Territories— all of which will align with the directions outlined by the NWT's new Mental Health Strategy.

"This will be transformational for the Territories," says Dr. MacDougall, who spent much of July and August working out the details and goals of the partnership. "There will be

opportunities for residents to be part of this, as well as any interested faculty members," she says.

Dr. Sonia Chehil, Director of Dalhousie Global Psychiatry, will be the physician lead on the project. She too will visit the NWT in the coming months, as will **Dr. Nick Delva**. Dr. MacDougall however, will be doing most of the hands-on work.

The Northwest Territories and Western Nunavut will provide the team with some very unique challenges clinically, as well as with service delivery. Some of the main issues faced by the population are trauma, significant alcohol issues and drug addictions, high crime rates, isolation and remoteness, and high rates of suicide.

Message from the Head

In 2009, the Department of Psychiatry commissioned a review of what was then known as our International Psychiatry Section (IPS). This was conducted by Dr. Martine Durier-Copp, Director, Centre for Advanced Management Education, Faculty of Management, Dalhousie University, and Dr. Richard Swinson, recently the Chair of the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioural Neurosciences at McMaster University. The review was laudatory and made several recommendations, one being that the IPS focus to a greater extent on underserviced areas of our own country, and on aboriginal mental healthcare: "The sphere of activity of the IPS should also be delineated, and the decision to include First Nations and Inuit health activities as part of its mandate, made." In consequence, the IPS was renamed "Dalhousie Global Psychiatry" (DGP), and when the opportunity to develop a partnership with the Northwest Territories arose, the course of action was clear.

The Mission Statement of the Stanton Territorial Health Authority (STHA) is "Caring people providing excellent and culturally-relevant health services, as a territorial referral centre, to residents of the Northwest Territories and the Kitikmeot region of Nunavut." Thus the catchment area of the STHA is vast, while the catchment population is only about 50,000 people, who speak eleven different languages. As you will read in the front-page story of this issue of Headlines, in its partnership

with the Government of the Northwest Territories Department of Health and Social Services, the Yellowknife Health and Social Service Authority, and the STHA, DGP will provide clinical care, both on-site and via telehealth, and guidance on the development of mental healthcare services, and will also collaborate on teaching and research. As a resident, Dr. Arlene MacDougall had worked with Dr. Sonia Chehil, Director of DGP, and now, as a Fellow, Dr. MacDougall will be leading the development of our partnership with the NWT. Like the other territories and provinces, the NWT wishes to utilize its healthcare dollars wisely and also have a skilled and reliable workforce the Dalhousie-NWT partnership will be devoted to these ends. The reader will be interested to examine the NWT's strategic plan for mental health, released in June of this year: "2012 • 2015 A Shared Path Towards Wellness Mental Health and Addictions Action. Plan." This is available at: http://www. hlthss.gov.nt.ca/pdf/reports/mental_ health and addictions/2012/english/a shared_path_towards_wellness.pdf. The Plan includes the following action for 2012-13: "In partnership with Stanton Territorial Hospital, collaborate with the Department of Psychiatry at Dalhousie University to explore the potential for expanded clinical service delivery and mental health program development." We are aiming to have the kind of long-term, high-quality relationship with the NWT as currently pertains with our



partners in the Caribbean area: Tobago, Grenada, St. Lucia and Guyana.

September, of course, represents the start of another school year, and the resumption of our rich and varied opportunities for learning, not that academic activities came to a standstill in the summer months! As can be seen within the pages of this issue, a number of summer students were busily engaged in research projects, the Sun Life Financial Chair in Adolescent Mental Health, Dr. Stan Kutcher, ran the Second Annual Academy in School Mental Health, Dalhousie Global Psychiatry conducted more than one visit to the Caribbean area (as well as preparing for the NWT initiative), our first Clinician Investigator Program resident, Dr. Daniel Rasic, successfully defended his MSc thesis. grant applications were prepared, preparations were made for teaching in the 2012-13 academic year, Simpson Landing (the new community-focused integration and recovery units) was



In this issue of Headlines, we are profiling two of this year's psychiatry summer students: Ms. Caoimhe McParland and Ms. Kristen Higgins.

Caoimhe McParland

Ms. Caoimhe McParland returned to work with the Mood Disorders group this summer after a successful summer last year with the research program. Ms. McParland is a student of Acadia University, entering her second year of studies in September. She is a member of the Acadia University Global Brigades and volunteered at a medical clinic in Honduras with the organization. Ms. McParland also volunteers with Acadia's SMILE program where she works with a child with Autism. Once the captain of her high school soccer team, she went on to play centre mid-fielder for the Acadia Axewomen soccer team.

Her studentship project with **Dr. Martin Alda** and the Mood Disorders group examines the relative efficacy of combination treatments with that of monotherapies using data from clinical trials of prophylaxis of Bipolar Disorder. She is reviewing published studies and applying for access to data from unpublished trials that compared combinations of two drugs with mood stabilizer monotherapy. Extracted data is being entered in a database to be analyzed. Ms. McParland is assisting in writing the final report and presenting findings.

Kristen Higgens

Ms. Kristen Higgins developed her research skills in psychiatric epidemiology under the supervision of Dr. Lachlan McWilliams at Acadia University. She is joining us as a summer student with the Early Psychosis program under the supervision of **Dr. Phil Tibbo**. Kristen completed her BSc. Honours in Psychology degree this year, with her thesis titled "Orthographic Influences on Metaphonological Tasks: Evidence from Event-Related Brain Potentials (ERP)" and will be applying to do her post graduate degree in clinical psychology. She was president of the Acadia University Psychology Association and works as a research assistant for Dr. Randy Newman in psycholinguistic research.

Following a similar one-year project in the Capital District Health region, Ms. Higgins is working to delineate the pathways to care in first episode psychosis in the Annapolis Valley Health region. She is interviewing patients, organizing and analyzing data, and writing up the results at the end of the summer. She will present the results of the study at this year's Department of Psychiatry Research Day.

Sun Life Financial Chair in Adolescent Mental Health

Sun Life Financial Chair in Adolescent Mental Health

Collaboration with China and Sun-Life Chair proving successful

More than two and half years ago **Dr. Stan Kutcher** gave the keynote address on *Mental Health and the School Environment: Secondary Schools, Promotion and Pathways to Care*, at the 19th World Congress of the International Association for Child and Adolescent Psychiatry and Allied Professions conference in Beijing, China. It was this address that would initiate a flood of requests to work with the Sun Life Financial Chair team.

Since then Dr. Stan Kutcher and his team have been working with various partners in China. They worked with the Shanghai Mental Health Centre of Shanghai Jiaotong University to develop a comprehensive community and school-based approach to ADHD in children and adolescents. The approach was adapted from Dr. Kutcher's School Mental Health Pathways to Care model, and focused on ADHD training for educators, health professionals and parents. The modified program was

applied in Shanghai and implemented in more than 200 schools where it was exceptionally successful. The feedback received was excellent and the program will be extended to other areas in China.

The Sun Life team has also worked with Peking University Sixth Hospital (Peking University Mental Health Institute) to help develop a mental health training program. The hope is to create a more formal collaboration between the Dalhousie Department of Psychiatry, the IWK and Peking University.

The final relationship is with Beijing Normal University. Here the desire is to take the mental health curriculum and teacher training program developed by Dr. Kutcher and modify it for use in China.

Dr. Kutcher is happy with how things are going and says "I'm very pleased to have established these collaborations and am hoping they will become more formalized and continue in the future."



In July, our team hosted the Second Annual Academy in School Mental Health at Halifax West High School. This annual summer workshop provides educators with an opportunity to receive mental health literacy training from a team of mental health care professionals and educators. The structure of the Academy focuses on the most common mental illnesses seen in teenagers and provides strategies for educators to better support these students.

This year more than 120 educators from across North America participated in the



three-day training session, which proved to be an even bigger success than last year. Our Provincial Minister of Education, Ms. Ramona Jennex, and Provincial Minister of Health, Mr. David Wilson, were on hand to show their support for school mental health. We are pleased to

announce that planning is already underway for next year's Academy.

Mental Health & High School Curriculum Training across the Province

A recent national survey stated that Canadian teachers are feeling ill equipped and under-resourced to adequately support the mental health of students. Many are calling for better mental health resources and professional development in schools.

Our team is currently working with the Province to implement School Mental Health Curriculum Training in every high school in Nova Scotia. Teachers have already been trained to use this curriculum in both the Halifax Regional School Board and Tri-County Regional School Board and we hope to ensure that all nine school boards are fully trained by 2013.

This initiative represents a major step for the mental health of young people in the Province of Nova Scotia as a result of the sustained collaboration between our team and the Nova Scotia Department of Education. Although Nova Scotia is our primary focus, we will continue our collaboration with agencies and institutions outside the province to support school mental health across cross the country.

Dr. Paul Janssen Chair in Psychotic Disorders

It is very pleasing to see the continued increase in depth and variety of psychosis research in the Department of Psychiatry. Current investigations range from identifing biological correlates of psychosis using neuroimaging and genetic techniques, to pharmacologic and non-pharmacologic treatment studies, to investigating psychosis with respect to health systems. While not an exhaustive list, below is a summary of active studies.

Clinical trials

Clinical trials (headed by **Dr. Heather Milliken**) are currently focusing on pharmacological treatments for residual positive and negative symptoms in psychosis. In addition, there are two trials examining adjunctive medication options in the treatment of psychosis (Niacin, Metformin).

Neuroimaging

DPRF (Department of Psychiatry Research Fund)-and CIHR (Canadian Institutes of Health Research)-funded neuroimaging studies in high field strength spectroscopy continue, examining white matter changes in early phases of psychosis. The Janssen Chair was also recently successful in obtaining a NSHRF (Nova Scotia Health Research Foundation) Establishment Grant to examine the neuroimaging correlates of NPAS3 gene variants in psychosis.

Dr. Jacob Cookey, a psychiatry resident in the Clinical Investigator Program, has started his two-year research program with the Janssen Chair and Dr. Denise Bernier. He will be focusing his MSc studies on a project investigating age of initial cannabis use on white matter structures using multimodal imaging techniques. Using fMRI, Dr. Kim Good continues with her investigation on reward motivation and

expectancy in early phase psychosis smokers.

Summer students

We were very pleased to have two summer research students working the Janssen Chair and his team. As mentioned on page 3, Ms. Kristen Higgins investigated the Pathways to Care in Early Phase Psychosis in health regions outside of HRM. We wish Kristen well as she enters her PhD Program at Dalhousie University in Psychology.

Ms. Alisha Hiscott was a summer co-op student from St. Mary's University and examined the implementation, barriers and facilitators of the new provincial Early Psychosis Standards with all the health regions in the province. She interviewed members of the Provincial Psychosis Network in addition to administrators in all of the nine health regions in the province. The document summarizing her work, will prove very beneficial in moving the provincial standards forward. We also wish her well in her final year at SMU.

Family studies

It is important to note two studies that are centered on family members of individuals with psychosis. Ms. Margie Crown is investigating two modes of family education in early psychosis and their effects on levels of distress and knowledge. **Dr. David Whitehorn** is examining Mindfulness-Based Therapy for family members. Both DPRF funded projects have direct applications to family care.

The Janssen Chair will be attending the 8th International Conference on Early Psychosis (IEPA) in San Francisco in October. He will be accompanied by other NSEPP Staff and researchers, as five abstracts have been accepted for presentation at the IEPA Meeting. This international conference is only held every two years and focuses not only

on research, but also programming, in the area of early phase psychosis.

In addition to the above health systems projects, the Janssen Chair is actively involved with a project entitled "Sustaining recovery: Supporting the transition from

specialized services to primary care for at risk youth." This project is supported through a CIHR Meetings and Planning grant and the Chair will be in Toronto in the fall to meet with other Canadian researchers to further the research in this area.

Global Psychiatry welcomes Dr. Arlene MacDougall



Dr. Arlene MacDougall joined the Global Psychiatry team on July 1. She is completing a joint Fellowship in Global Psychiatry and First Episode Psychosis under the co-supervision of **Dr. Sonia Chehil** and **Dr. Phil Tibbo**.

Dr. MacDougall's Fellowship work in the Global Psychiatry Section is focused on the establishment of a collaborative partnership between the Dalhousie Department of Psychiatry and the Stanton Territorial Health Authority, though she is also involved in the curriculum development and implementation of the post-graduate Master's of Medicine in Neuropsychiatry Program (MMNP) in Guyana. As well, she is studying the prevalence of mental illness in people living with HIV in Guyana and their current access to mental health care.

In keeping with her clinical and research

interest in psychotic disorders, Dr. MacDougall will also be working with the Nova Scotia Early Psychosis Program over the course of her Fellowship year.

Dr. MacDougall completed an Honours BSc (Human Biology and Bioethics double major) at the University of Toronto prior to obtaining her MD degree at the University of British Columbia. Following medical school, she completed her postgraduate medical training in Psychiatry as well as Master's Degree in Neuroscience at McMaster University. To date, her clinical research interests have included the characterization and diagnosis of lateonset psychotic disorder and autobiographical memory functioning in schizophrenia and mood disorders.

Global Psychiatry Visits Tobago

Ms. Sandra Hennigar and Mr. Peter Croxall visited Tobago, the smaller of the two main islands which make up the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago in the Southeastern Caribbean, during the week of June 24 to June 30. A new hospital is nearing completion in Scarborough, the main town, and among other things it will have a brand new 12-bed inpatient psychiatry unit, to replace the current unit in the old hospital. This has raised issues about the physical security features of the new unit, staff training and unit programming, staff and psychiatrist roles, relationships with the ambulatory mental health services across the island, specialized longer-term residential recovery services for those with severe and persistent mental illnesses, overall organizational structure of the services, and the need for a mental health strategy for the island within the Trinidad and Tobago Mental Health Strategy. Ms. Hennigar and Mr. Croxall were warmly welcomed By Drs. Crooks, Parillon and Vince, as well as



inpatient and ambulatory staff. Meetings and discussions were held with mental health professionals, as well as with Mrs. P. Cumberbach, the Tobago Health Authority CEO. It is anticipated that recommendations contained in the trip report will lead to training and other projects over the next year or two.

Police and Mental Health Project in Guyana

Ms. Mary Pyche, Dr. Scott Theriault, Constable Angela Balcom, HPD and Ms. Sandra Hennigar joined Dr. Sonia **Chehil** in Georgetown, Guyana on July 14 for a week. The team was there to consult with various ministries on improving their first responder response to emotionally disturbed persons (EDP). Currently, stigma combined with lack of an integrated system results in poor outcomes for the EDP and loss of work productivity due to staff stress and burnout. The team spent the first two days meeting with top administrators of the Police Commissionaires, the Director of Police Training, the Director of Prisons, and the Permanent Secretary for Homeland Security, Human Services and Local and Municipal Governments. as well as mental health staff from the Ministry.

A group of 35 individuals from various ministries came together for a stakeholders meeting to begin the conversations about the outstanding issues and shared concerns and potential new ways of moving forward.

Ms. Pyche and Constable Balcom presented some initial information about models of response, including the model used in Halifax. In the afternoon, they led the group through table discussions on how to proceed from this point.

The last two days were spent on training, giving the group an idea of the type of training that occurs in Nova Scotia with our new recruits and regular police officers. The overall response from our Guyanese partners was extremely positive from all levels of government. Everyone agreed this is an extremely important issue for Guyana, its police force and other first responders, as well as those who are mentally ill and their families. Representatives for the

Regions agreed to continue the multistakeholder meetings and to push their respective ministries to find resources to make this a priority. The Dalhousie Department of Psychiatry will continue to support the project by seeking funding opportunities. The first funding submission was made for the Grand Challenges Canada Stars in Global Health Grant, which was due early in September.

Clinical Divisions of the Department of Psychiatry

Each month we highlight one of the many services offered by the Department of Psychiatry. In this issue we feature information on the Mood Disorders Program at both CDHA and the IWK.

Mood Disorders Program

CDHA Mood Disorders Program

The Mood Disorders Program is a tertiary-care outpatient program serving patients with bipolar disorder and major depression. The clinic currently follows approximately 500 patients, with outpatient appointments averaging 4300 per year. In addition the Program receives about 400 referrals annually from psychiatrists and family physicians. The Annual Review Clinic, which follows former patients of the clinic in collaboration with their family physicians and allows a quick access back into the clinic, sees over 100 patients per year. More than 500 outpatient visits are to psychotherapy and education groups. Community stakeholders and organizations are actively involved.

The Program contributes to undergraduate and postgraduate teaching of psychiatry and also regularly supervises residents, graduate students, clinical research Fellows and medical students on an elective basis.

The research focus of the program includes the clinical and genetic aspects of mood disorders, pharmacogenetics, neurobiology of affective disorders and suicide, studies of children of bipolar parents, and brain imaging studies. Through research grants the members of the Program have established and supported The Maritime Bipolar Registry, a voluntary confidential registry of over 450 subjects that serves as a resource for research, clinical care and education.

IWK Mood Disorder Team

The IWK Mood Disorders Team, based at the IWK Maritime Outpatient Psychiatry clinic, provides consultation and follow-up for youth up to the age of 19 years. The clinic accepts referrals for diagnostic assessment from the Maritime Provinces and will follow youth within the Halifax Regional Municipality who have either recurrent or treatment-resistant major depression, major depression with psychotic features or bipolar disorder. The Mood Care Path team, which includes the Mood Disorders team and clinicians from the three IWK Community Mental Health Clinics, provides education to IWK clinicians about mood disorders, and organizes CBT groups for teens with depression or mixed anxiety and depression.

Dr. Alissa Pencer publishes work in International Journal of Mental Health and Addiction



Research Opportunity: Making Memory Better for Older Adults with Mild Cognitive Impairment

Dr. Karen Chipman, Neuropsychology, recently received a grant from the Nova Scotia Health Research Foundation to pilot a 10-week memory training group for older adults with Mild Cognitive Impairment (MCI).

The Memory for Life study will offer the training group on several occasions over the next three years to individuals with MCI and their study partner (e.g., family member or friend). Participants will learn and practice strategies that will address ways to manage day-to-day memory issues, including how to remember appointments, learn people's names, remember passwords or PINs, and keep track of personal belongings.

The Memory for Life study is now welcoming referrals from clinicians in the Capital District Mental Health Program. If you have a client with suspected or diagnosed MCI who may benefit from the memory training program, they would love to hear from you!

Consider referring if your client:

- Has recently noticed a change in memory or thinking ability
- Has mild trouble with the more complicated tasks of daily life
- Does not meet the criteria for dementia
- Does not have a chronic psychiatric illness (e.g., Schizophrenia, Bipolar disorder)
- Has been on stable medications for at least 4 weeks
- Is willing and able to participate in an 8-month study

The Debate Continues...

Psychiatry Debates Guiding Principles

Respect for others' opinions, for individuals with mental illness and those who care for them.

The goal of the debates is learning. Debating differing opinions will increase our appreciation of the complexities within our discipline.

The "truth" almost always lies between the two sides of the debate.

All levels of evidence for an argument are welcomed, but highest levels of evidence should be weighed most heavily, if available for the issue at hand.

Based on the experience of the first debate however, there will be some format changes to enhance the overall experience. The main change will involve increased audience participation. The time available for the debaters will be reduced in favor of greater time allotted for audience questions and discussion.

In Memoriam: Dr. Irmingard Lenzer

Members of Dalhousie's Centre for Emotions and Health, the Halifax Infirmary's Emergency Department, and those who knew her in the wider community were saddened to learn that Dr. Irmingard Lenzer passed away on May 15. She was 73.

Dr. Lenzer's work in the innovative Medically Unexplained Symptoms clinic as an Intensive Short-Term Dynamic Psychotherapy (ISTDP) practitioner was the culmination of more than a decade of study and training in the Centre for Emotions and Health and of a lifetime of study and devotion to helping others.

After completing a BA at UC, Los Angeles and a PhD in physiological psychology from Indiana University in 1969, Dr. Lenzer was appointed Assistant Professor in the Department of Psychology at Saint Mary's University. She was promoted to a full Professor in 1981. That year she also completed her tenure as a founding member of the Nova Scotia Board of Examiners in Psychology. Just prior,

she had served for three years as Chair of the Psychology Department.

During her thirty-five years with Saint Mary's, Dr. Lenzer was active in basic and applied grant-funded research, administrative duties at all levels. professional practice, and teaching at both the graduate and undergraduate levels. She joined Dalhousie's Centre for Emotions and Health in 2001 and

worked in ISTDP until her final days.

This scholarship will be awarded to the candidate who is thought to best reflect the spirit of dedication with which Dr. Lenzer undertook learning this method.
