WIPING OUT HEPATITIS C

Dr. Lisa Barrett, a clinician scientist in the Division of Infectious Diseases, is leading a Hepatitis C immunity study in PEI's provincial correctional centre. The pilot study will provide new oral drugs known as direct-acting antiviral agents to 60 offenders at the centre and follow them through a year of treatment to monitor re-infection and any potential side effects of therapy on HCV immunity.



While less than one percent of the general population is infected with Hepatitis C, infection rates in correctional facilities in Canada are well over 20 percent. Eliminating the disease among this offender population is an important step in eliminating the disease nationally.

The newly approved oral medications have proven cure rates of 90 to 97 percent with minimal side effects, so they are a practical choice for treating Hepatitis C over time. PEI is the first province in Canada to fund the medications. Eventually, Dr. Barrett hopes this pilot study in correctional facilities will lead to further studies and access for people in corrections settings in the Atlantic Provinces and around the country.

HEAD, DIVISION OF RESPIROLOGY

Congratulations to Dr. Paul Hernandez on his appointment as Head, Division of Respiriology. Dr. Hernandez had been the acting Head/Chief since March 2014.




Dr. Hernandez is a professor of medicine and has been a staff respirologist at the QEII since 1995. He is the Medical Director of the Pulmonary Rehabilitation program and Medical Co-Lead of the 3-Intermediate Medical Care Unit at the QEII and a long-serving member of the Medical Advisory Board for the Lung Association of Nova Scotia.

Nationally Dr. Hernandez is the chair of the COPD Clinical Assembly of the Canadian Thoracic Society, chair of the Respiriology Examination Committee of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada, and member of the Canadian Respiratory Research Network of the Canadian Lung Association.

DR. DES LEDDIN AUTHORS BOOK

DALHOUSIE'S INVOLVEMENT IN WWI

Dr. Des Leddin, gastroenterologist and professor of medicine, recently authored *The No. 7 Stationary Hospital (Dalhousie University) In World War One*, a book that details a contingent of students and professors from the Dalhousie Medical College who joined the war effort to treat the thousands of wounded. The 100th anniversary of the establishment of the No.7 hospital was November 9, 2015.



The No. 7 Hospital was formed from a desperate need for medical personnel to treat Canadian soldiers at the front. It was comprised of 162 personnel, including officers, non-commissioned officers and female nurses – all students and faculty of the Dalhousie Medical College. It travelled to England in December 1915, later moving to France, particularly the northern region. The hospital spent over a year in the French village of Arques, close to the front. At one point, medics treated German soldiers wounded in explosions at the Messines Ridge. Those explosions were from mines laid by men from Nova Scotia.

“One side was blowing them up. Another side was patching them up,” Leddin said in a recent CBC interview. “I’ve never understood how medics were able to reconcile those roles.”

The man in charge of the hospital was Colonel Dr. John Stewart, a well-known surgeon from the Halifax region. After the No. 7 Hospital returned from Europe in 1919, Dr. Stewart was appointed Dean of Medicine at the Medical College where he served until 1932. Ms. Laura Hubley was the head nurse and matron of the No. 7 Hospital. Ms. Hubley established training standards for nursing education in Nova Scotia and beyond. She retired from nursing practice in 1938.




